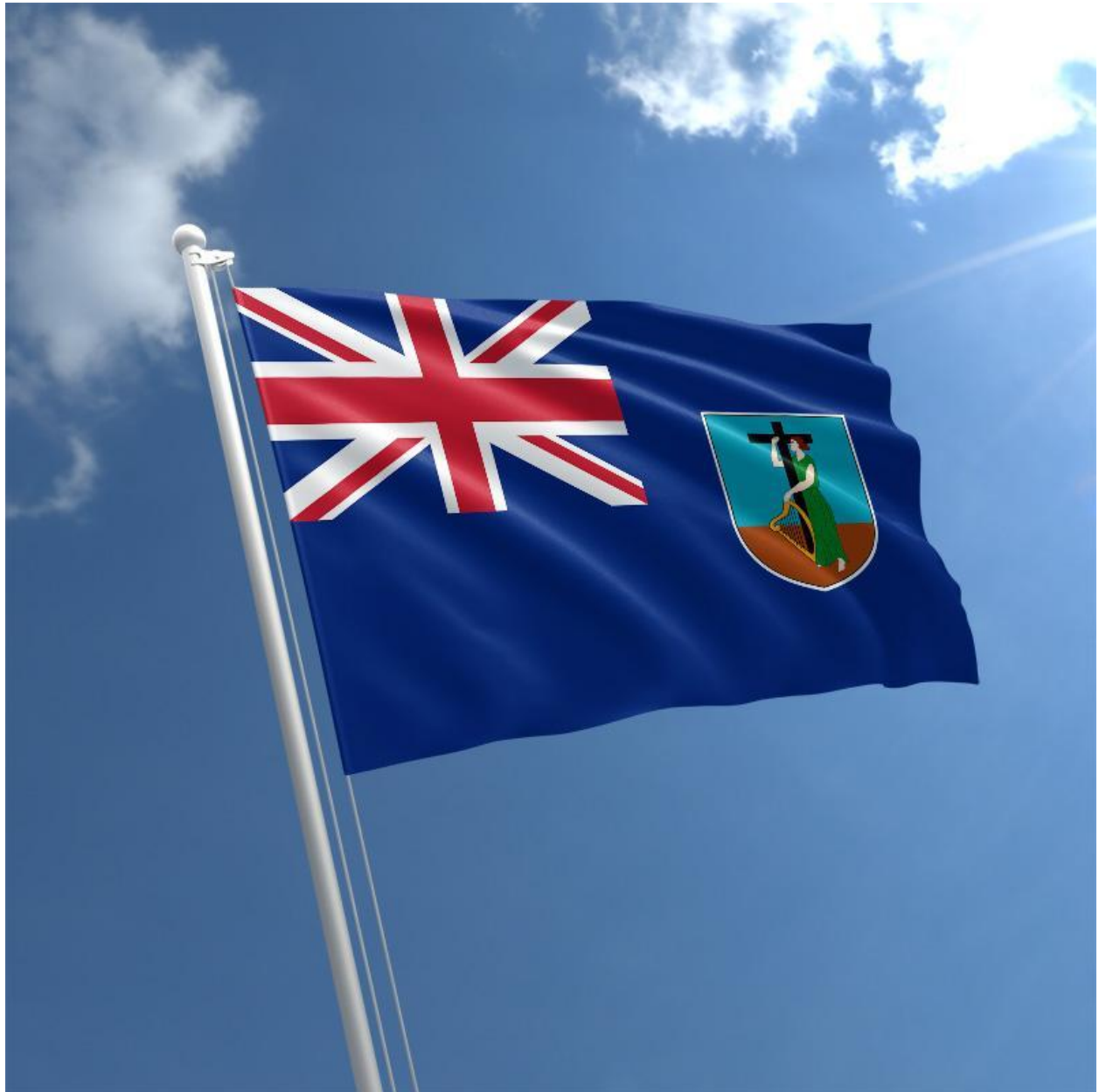

Territory of Montserrat





Introduction

Montserrat is a self-governing British Overseas Territory located in the Leeward Islands of the eastern Caribbean. Nicknamed the **"Emerald Isle of the Caribbean"** because of its Irish heritage and lush volcanic landscape, the island has undergone profound transformation since the eruption of the Soufrière Hills volcano beginning in 1995. Much of the southern half of the island, including the former capital, Plymouth, remains within an exclusion zone. Despite these challenges, Montserrat maintains political stability, a high standard of governance, and continues to rebuild its economy around tourism, construction, and international financial services.

Montserrat lies approximately 50 km southwest of Antigua and is entirely volcanic in origin.

Volcanic Hazard Assessment







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The Soufrière Hills volcano remains active and is continuously monitored. Although eruptive activity has declined from its peak, access to much of southern Montserrat—including the former capital, Plymouth—remains restricted. The volcano continues to shape land-use planning, infrastructure development, and disaster preparedness across the territory.

Strategic Outlook (2026–2030)

Montserrat is expected to remain among the Caribbean's most politically stable territories. Continued British financial support, improvements to infrastructure around Little Bay, and carefully managed tourism are likely to support gradual economic growth. The island's principal long-term strategic risk remains renewed volcanic activity, which continues to influence development planning and population distribution. While economic opportunities are modest due to its small size, Montserrat's governance, security environment, and institutional resilience provide a stable foundation for future development.
